
## Review Pennsylvania Handwriting Analysis Forum March 25, 2023







Here are three of the famous people whose handwriting we analyzed at our March 25, 2023 meeting:. Judy Garland, Ron DeSantis, and Hunter Biden. The fourth was Jill Biden, whose photo appears at the end of this Review in summary No. 4.

The Pennsylvania Handwriting Analysis Forum met by Zoom on March 25, 2023. We discussed several topics. Here is a summary of each one. 1. Member Edith Malin and I presented the new **calligraphy service** by online businesses that were featured in the Allentown *Morning Call* and a r ecent NPR segment. Their target customers are **people who are disenchanted** with their signatures because they are illegible or these people want to a new image

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of themselves or other reasons to change the look of their signatures. These businesses have a range of styles to adopt. As was raised in the *Call* and NPR,

this creates a problem for the places where signatures are recorded and are important: bank and credit card signatures, voter registration, legal and financial documents, etc. We discussed how these customers are handling this issue. We also waded into the

offshoot of this area and discussed how we should advise a client on crafting their signature to minimize a forgery. How should a forgery-proof signature be crafted? Answer at the end of these summaries.





We 2. discussed an article from The New Yorker about how artificial intelligence in the digital world is being applied to mental health and specifically for areas such as psychotherapy,

Nevertheless, science is moving ahead to fill the vast need to deal with our everincreasing plague of mental illness, which has also exploded for our young people, especially from their use of those little devices in their hands and the experience of isolation during the virus pandemic.

GOD EVERY GUY ON TEEN WOLF

"What hath God wrought?" The telegram thus followed. That long history had ended with the last one

sent in 2006. I posed this query to the group: That last telegram had the message about the two ways

of **instant** long distance communication that it had also replaced. What were they? Answers below.

1. Forgery-proof is extreme.

However, a signature that is at least tough to forge should have many strokes in it, elaborate and be written spontaneously.

many strokes in it, elaborate ones, and be written spontaneously. The last is important because a forger is trying to copy your signature and must take their time to do it properly. A fast, smooth series of lines are not easy to copy because of the natural tension the forger is feeling, which causes the lines to wander, if ever so slightly. The forger must also take their time with so many lines to copy and keep close to the look of the original strokes of their victim.

8. The answer: Smoke signals and flag signals, as in semaphores.
